Steve writes

As I'm sure I've reflected before, is it me or does the time go faster as we got older?!

A real anchor for me and I hope and pray for you is the church liturgical year that often gives an anchor in the midst of the storm. It is a chance, every year, to journey with Jesus through birth, death, resurrection, ascension, Pentecost and then looking ahead to His return.

November is a month rich with feasts and festivals – we will have begun with All Saints' Day (happy patronal festival to all at Aston!) and All Souls' Day where the emphasis is on the saints -living and departed-who have and continue to inspire us as beacons of God's light. Another way of putting this is that we remember the 'church temporal' (the church on earth) and the 'church eternal' (the saints in eternal light). It is comforting to know that we are always surrounded by 'a great cloud of witnesses' who cheer us on our way.


As much as we acknowledge the 'church eternal', All Souls' also confronts us with our own mortality and the mortality of those we 'love but see no longer.' We remember shared grief but also knowing 'the sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life.'

Also in November, we have the option of observing the 'Kingdom Season' for the Sundays up to and including the wonderful festival (and relatively new) of Christ the King. Instead of sticking to the colour green, we have the option of red which we don't often use Sunday by Sunday. The season is a wonderful segway to both the end of the church year but also looking forward with renewed hope throughout the season of Advent.

Bishop Mariann Edgar Budde, the bishop of Washington who famously preached to Donald Trump, has recently described hope as a 'discipline'. We acknowledge the challenge in her words and take comfort from them as we, too, look to the future and, God-willing, before not-too-long, welcome the new rector to the benefice.





We look forward to meeting with our friends again including some new members. See you in November!






