#### Dear friends

On a human level it must have been very difficult for Jesus to turn people away but He knew it would take him a lifetime to persuade his fellow Jews that, He, was their Messiah. So he prioritised his Ministry on his disciples who, after receiving the "Holy Spirit" would travel abroad to preach the Gospel.

This meant all the Churches, Cathedrals, Chapels and a lot of the schools and hospitals in the world were built, because of the witness of these remarkable people.





Now that the season is coming to an end, and in case you have some courgettes that have been overlooked on the plant, here's an idea. It's been tested.

#### **COURGETTE SOUP**

500gms Potato, unpeeled and roughly chopped

2 Vegetable stock cubes

1kg courgettes roughly chopped

Bunch Spring onions –sliced save one for serving

100gms Extra mature cheddar – grated plus a little to serve

Grating fresh nutmeg

Put the potatoes into a pan and just cover, crumble in the stock cubes

Bring to the boil, then cover and cook for 5 minutes

Add the courgettes and cook for another 5 minutes

Take off the heat and stir in the cheese with salt and pepper. Whizz to a thick soup adding more hot water to your taste. Serve with added grated cheddar, grated nutmeg and spring onions and pepper. *Or* cool and freeze for up to 3 months




# Twyford

#### GRAFFITI IN CHURCH PORCH.

You may think that graffiti is a modern problem. However there is graffiti inside the church porch, engraved in the plaster, that it is thought dates back to the Civil war (1642 - 1651.) It was probably done by Oliver Cromwell's soldiers who were based in the village at Weston Hall, now the Coopers Arms. Maybe one of them was the Banksy of his day! Amongst the graffiti is the date 1648, a figure, and the outline of a hand. The hand is small and appears to be a child's; but perhaps not, as all those years ago people were a lot smaller than they are now. When the church porch was restored about 30years ago, the plaster with the graffiti on was carefully taken down and then after the new timber beams, etc were put in, it was put back in its original place. More care could not have been taken if the graffiti was a Banksy!


