## ***Nick writes***



What a joy it has been for me to join you in the benefice as I embark on this three month period, supporting you during part of your interregnum.

For those who weren't at the United Benefice Service at the start of the month, a quick introduction to who I am.

I spent much of my childhood overseas, first in Seychelles (until I was 4) and then Pakistan (until I was 14), where my parents were missionaries with Feba Radio. We returned to the UK where I did my GCSEs and A Levels in Worthing, on the South Coast, then a Theology Degree at Durham University. This was followed by teacher training back on the South Coast, and starting as a Religious Studies teacher, again in Worthing. In 2003, Anna and I married, having met at university. Josh, our firstborn, arrived in 2006. We moved to Repton in 2008, where Anna took on running one of the boarding houses. Luke came along in 2011. We're still living in Repton, Anna's now on the Senior Management Team, and both boys are at the school. I started my training for the priesthood in 2018, training at Queen's in Birmingham. I completed a curacy at St. Peter's in the City, Derby, and have spent much of the last year on a secondment at Church House, working as Health and Vitality Coordinator for the diocese.

I've been so very grateful for the welcome I've received from folk across the benefice, as I've been to some of the churches during April. I'm looking forward to meeting others of you in the coming weeks. It's been a particular privilege to celebrate Holy Week and Easter here in the benefice.

And what an extraordinary time Holy Week is. In a world that can seem so very topsy-turvy, filled with uncertainty, Easter reminds us of the certainty of the hope that our loving God offers us. What a reassurance to celebrate that hope. Holy week grounds us in a story that shows us the love that God has for us, stepping down, emptying himself of all but love.

As we continue towards Ascension and Pentecost, the story moves to the coming of the Holy Spirit, promised to all Jesus' followers. However topsy-turvy life might feel, we can know that we need face nothing alone. God promises his Spirit can be with us and in us, and this has been the experience of countless Christians through all generations.

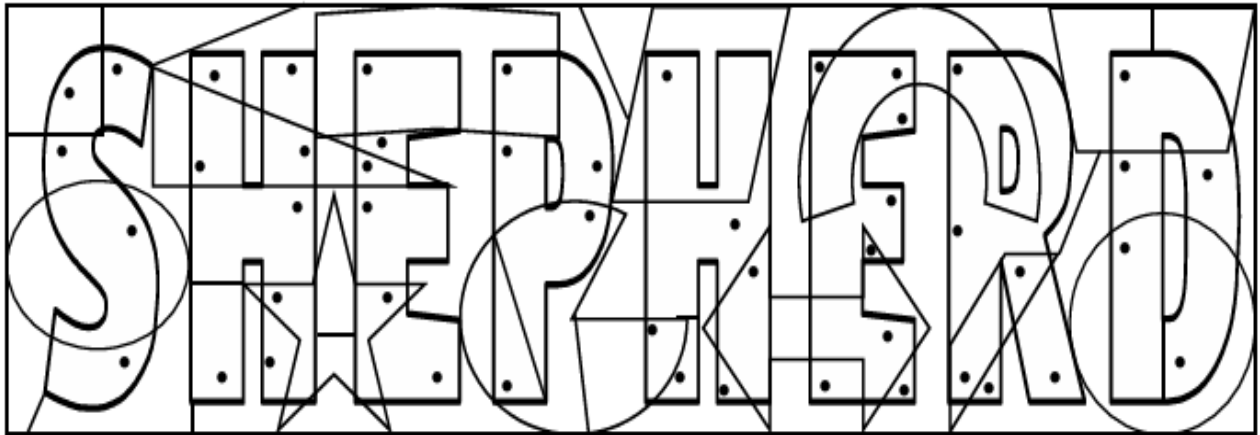
It is great to see that the steps are already being well used and by some who hitherto would have been unable to access the village on foot.

The handrails were paid for with a generous donation from Aston Welfare Trust to whom we are very grateful.

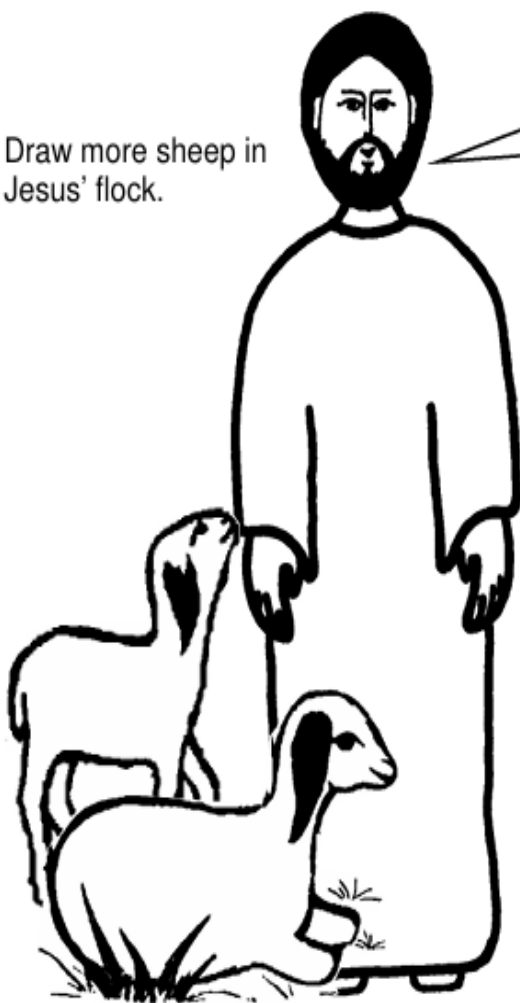

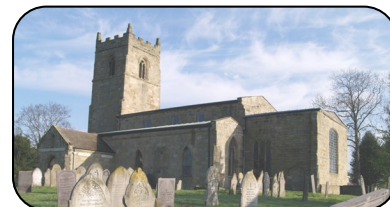

The story of Boudicca, although much of it is cloaked in poor evidence is still extraordinary. Among these, in the part that we now know as East Anglia, was the kingdom of the Iceni, whose warrior queen Boudicca stood against the Roman invaders when her male counterparts were too weak to do so.

Gathering support from other Celtic tribes, the red-headed queen swept across eastern England, and came close to driving the Romans out altogether. 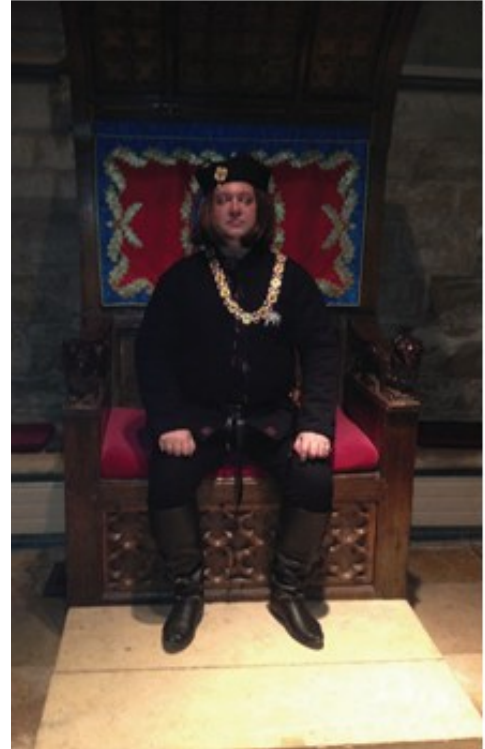

## ***The night before Bosworth***

Richard III is one of the most controversial figures in British history, seen by some as a ruthless murderer and by others as the innocent victim of Tudor propaganda. The last English king to be killed in battle, his death at the battle of Bosworth in 1485 has often been viewed as the end of the Middle Ages, and the beginning of the Modern period.

This costumed portrayal by historian Dr Gareth Williams shows Richard the night before Bosworth, looking back on his life and considering whether or not he has done enough to earn God's support against Henry Tudor the following morning. The costumed performance is followed by a discussion of the historical evidence on which it is based, and why the surviving evidence has led to such divergent interpretations of this important historical figure.



## **SAVORY BREAD & BUTTER PUDDING**

### To serve 4 portions

8 slices    bread – buttered one side

1 whole    medium onion chopped and spread over the bread

2 rashers    cooked and cooled bacon then spread over the onion

100 gms    grated cheddar cheese

250mls            milk

1                  egg

salt, pepper

Decorate with sliced tomatoes and more grated cheese, Sprinkle with oregano

Bake, slowish oven, about 180° until brown on top
