Tony writes

Dear friends,

Don't say it too loudly, but some supermarkets, as well as having Halloween stuff in stock, have already started to have Christmas goods on display! It's a sad sign of our times, for we live in a world where shops and businesses take great delight in persuading us that we really need something, even if we haven't actually realised it yet. It's a culture of "never having enough."



Harvest Festival easily gets pushed out in the world beyond church and school. However, the tradition of recognizing some kind of harvest festival pre-dates the Christian Way by thousands of years. As soon as people started planting and growing things, they realised the success of their harvest was largely dependent on the weather as well as their own skill, so they began offering part of the harvest to the gods or in more monotheistic times to God. We see this in Deuteronomy 26, where, having given thanks to the Lord, each person in Israel is encouraged to bring before God the first fruit of the ground, which God has given.

In the sixth chapter of the Gospel according to St. John, Jesus, having just fed the multitudes, sent his disciples to the other side of the lake while he prayed. In the middle of the night, Jesus met the boat by walking across the lake, much to the disciples amazement. The crowd of people, having run around the lakeshore to find where Jesus and his disciples had gone, now ask him essentially "how on earth did you get here?" Jesus, always quick to avoid answering a question in a straightforward way, replies by wondering aloud about the crowds motivation. Did they come seeking him out because he had fed them? Was it because of the miracles? No, Jesus suggests, those things, while powerful and indicative of the work which God was doing in the world through Jesus, wouldn't sustain them for ever. What the crowd really came to find was "food that endures for eternal life."

This implies that they spent most of their time chasing after food which doesn't sustain, which seems to be a good metaphor for the superficial searching for entertainment and fulfilment which characterises much of our modern life. We are constantly fed the lie that we don't have enough and that more will make us happy. We only have to get wind, as in the pandemic, that there might be a shortage of something and we rush, to buy, buy more, more, more, more. We are, if we are honest, addicted to food that perishes, and the system is quite happy to keep us buying more, paying VAT, interest, and late fees, until the weight of debt crushes many people. Furthermore this narrative of buying more and disposing of more is proving to be unsustainable and doing untold harm to the planet as well as to our own mental well-being.

"Work for the food that endures to eternal life," says Jesus to them and to us. This Harvest, let's reject the narrative of "not enough." Let's take the time to stop feeding the addiction to accumulate for ourselves food that perishes, and give thanks to God for the abundance that we already have. Feasting on food that endures to eternal life will make us grateful and do good for our souls.

Our twelfth year has just begun in September with a total membership from all the churches involved of 190. At the first draw on 7th September the winning numbers were:


All the churches are extremely grateful for your support. Money received by each church last year through your membership is as follows:

Isabel Herod

Sadly St Bartholomew's PCC has to report the death of Isabel Herod, one of its long serving members and it sends its deepest sympathies to her daughter Christabel and all her family. Isabel was born at Seaton on 11th September 1927, went to school there and later to one in Carlisle. She trained as a nurse at Blackburn Royal Infirmary before moving to Great Ormand Street to nurse children. She then moved to Edinburgh to study midwifery and stayed for some time working on the Royal Mile where she met the Queen. Her next move was to join the Colonial Nursing Service and trained nurses throughout Nigeria where she supervised the building of a Nursing School in Kaduna. Whilst in Nigeria she met her husband Geoff, an engineer whom she married in 1964 and they settled in Ambaston where Christabel was born in 1969.

Isabel joined the newly formed Elvaston Women's Institute and the local church of St Bartholomew. She liked gardening, crosswords, baking and making jams and pickles. Some years ago she and Evadne made over 300 pots of jams and chutneys. She played a great part in the life of the church as besides being a member of the PCC she was a Churchwarden for twenty years and a member of the Melbourne Deanery Synod. Locally she was a trustee of the Elvaston United Charities and its chairman for some years. She also liked singing and was a member of a Derby Mixed Choir which often came to sing for weddings in Elvaston. She also sang music hall songs at local events which caused great hilarity when members of the audience were accosted by her wand or cheeky suggestions.

She has been unwell for the last few years and due to the Covid period has been sadly missed by her friends and neighbours and especially by those of us from St Bartholomews. May she rest in peace; she was truly a "good and faithful servant".

As many of you may know we have a fine, rather beautiful stained glass

window in the East end of the Church (see below). It was fitted in 1911 and was the gift of Sir William Towle. The artist was James Dudley Forsyth (1874 – 1926). He was a well known artist in stained glass with work in Westminster Abbey, the Baltic Exchange and many London and provincial churches. I have included an article, recently discovered, written by the late Leslie Cox which details the life of Sir William Towle and his meteoric rise from a blacksmith's son to a Knight of the Realm.

Sir William Towle 1849—1933

William Towle was born at Smithy Farm, Twyford in 1849, son of Henry Towle, the last of a long line of Blacksmith Farmers in Twyford.

William was eventually to choose a different career, far removed from his early Trentside home.

He attended local village schools, first Twyford and then Findern. He left home to lodge in Derby to work long hours as a humble pageboy at The Midland Hotel.

Just prior to William taking the job, the then owner, Thomas Jackson was in financial difficulties. The directors of the Midland Railway Company, realising the need for good hotels to enhance the railway's rising prosperity, bought the building in 1862, to start what was to become a thriving enterprise.

At 22, through long hours of hard work and enterprise, William became hotel manager. He took control of Derby Station refreshment rooms, and soon became head of the Midland Hotel and Catering Service.

He introduced train meals in the form of hamper, made up at his Derby hotel headquarters and delivered to other mainline stations daily. The empties returned to Derby to begin the cycle again next day.

A notice announced.

"On and after March 1, 1875 Luncheon Baskets, will be provided at the Derby Station at the following charges:-

No. 1 (For first class passengers). Containing - half a chicken with ham or tongue, salad, bread, cheese, butter, etc. and half a bottle of claret or burgundy 3s 0d.

No. 2 (second class passengers) Containing veal and ham pie with salad, bread, cheese, butter, etc. and a bottle of stout -2s 0d."

Third class passengers, it seems, were not catered for.

A footnote concluded this revolutionary idea: "The baskets will be fitted with the necessary appointments which it is earnestly requested may be replaced in their proper position, and the baskets handed to



one of the Company's Servants that they may be returned to Derby," boldly signed William Towle, Midland Hotel, Derby.

Helped greatly by his wife Elizabeth, who in these early days supervised the catering staff of the Midland Hotel, he improved the image of the railway's refreshment rooms. He made sure that tea and coffee was cheaper than intoxicating drinks.

In 1884 he re-organised the management of the Midland Grand Hotel at St Pancreas and took charge of the Queen's in Leeds.

He made frequent trips to Paris where he was responsible for building the Railway Hotel. Such was his position in national railways that he was given his own private carriage as a travelling office.

When he retired in 1914 the then chairman of the Midland Railway Company said of him, "We regret to lose Mr Towles' services which have been of the very greatest value to the Midland Railway Company and has placed this company in the premier position among railways in the excellence of its hotels, dining cars and refreshment rooms."

After his retirement William Towle was knighted for his services, and lived in the London area.

During his time at Derby he supported the Railway Church of St Andrews and sang for many years in its choir with a reputation for a fine bass voice.

In retirement, he made frequent visits to Twyford and provided a stained glass window in the east wall of the church in memory of his wife.

With the usual British stoicism for queuing, many climbed the tower to enjoy the wide ranging views from the top. The scouts ran a coconut shy that kept many entertained while a number of stall holders tempted visitors to part with their cash. A May pole was installed for the day and some, under instruction from Daryl, with music from Brain Dawson took to dancing around it!

More serious music was played on the church organ by Kathy Razzell. The food stall Punjabi Kitchen was greeted with great delight and at the end of the afternoon the folk group 'Calling Time' drew the afternoon to a close. Many thanks to all who helped in any way but particularly to the organizing committee, members of the Ukrainian community and the Scouts for their loan of tents and tables and the labour to erect and then later remove them, the village hall for their tables, Davlyn Construction for organizing the Portaloos, everyone who manned the stalls and all who managed to attend. We also are not forgetting the folks who tidied up afterwards! A reporter from the 'Village Voice' newspaper turned up so we may expect a piece in a future edition. October Facts.

In October 1974 the very first McDonald's in the UK opened its doors in London, and is still operating today!

The Twyford church in Hampshire, UK has a tradition of ringing its bells every year on October 7th. The origin of this tradition goes back to the 18th Century when a local resident called William David became lost in heavy fog while riding home at night. Much to his luck, he heard the church bells toll and from this, he managed to find his way home. As a form of thanks, he left some money to the church when he died so that the church could continue to ring their bells on October 7th every year, just in case there were any other lost travelers.

The first full moon after the Harvest Moon quite often falls in October and even has its own name. Known as the Hunter's Moon, it's one of the only two full moons (along with the Harvest Moon) that aren't connected to a specific month. Depending on the year the Hunter's Moon either falls in October or November.

This ruined the phone, soaked my trousers, and disconnected an important call. Women drivers! (Its all about self perception isn't it? Ed)


